





Day-By-Day Program

The Tällberg Forum can be seen as a smörgåsbord of activities from which you can compose a program of your choice. The Forum builds on several central program elements.

The Plenary sessions (one or two per day) provide participants with analyses on the main theme of the Forum. They all take place in the main tent in the Forum Center at Holen. They consist mainly of panel conversations, with a minimum of prepared statements. Artistic performances are an important integrated element. They are open to participating spouses and also to the general public and the media. In the tent, participants will be seated in pre-arranged Table Groups which will remain together for all plenary sessions.

The Design workshops (sessions on Thursday, Friday and Saturday mornings) give participants the opportunity to explore ten places from around the world in ten parallel workshops that take place in different hotels. The Design Workshops (more information on page 26-47) are open to the forum participants and media and, space permitting, to spouses and families. Participants sign up to a Design Workshop by picking up a card with the name of the session they have chosen at the entrance of the Forum Tent at Holen. The three consecutive sessions build on each other and are intended to move towards designing policies and strategies on the last day. Participants are encouraged to stick to the same Design Workshop on Thursday and Saturday but may wish to follow a different session on Friday. Space is provided on a first come-first served basis. The cards for Thursday's events will be available on Wednesday late afternoon, those for Friday by Thursday after lunch and those for Saturday by Friday after lunch.

Thematic Seminars are also offered as a complement to the Design Workshops on Friday (see page 48-49). Participants sign up by picking up a card with the name of the session they have chosen at the entrance of the Forum Tent at Holen. The cards will be available on Thursday after lunch. There will be space to accommodate all participants during each Design Workshop (and Thematic Seminar) session. However, we cannot guarantee participants a seat at the event of their choice.

In addition to these, there is a rich program of cultural performances, and open space of free time (for informal meetings, excursions, walks or just taking it easy).

What transition into sustainability will require

The world continues to drain down the natural capital base of resources upon which our economies, livelihoods and societies are built. A transition into sustainability is not a choice. It is a requirement. This will not only mean a complex myriad of resource adaptations and technological innovations. We will not manage the transition without a change in mindsets. How do we move into a sustainable interdependent world – a world that can no longer afford to wage strategies of me over you? This discussion goes beyond the vested interests of sectors and nations vying for supremacy and picks up the concept of an enlightened self-interest in order to transform our cognitive base to a whole systems view grounded firmly in humanistic values.

Human security is no longer a mere tactical military proposition. It is a volatile barometer for the whole of existence. The risks that threaten the human community go by the names of climate change, energy supplies, allocation of resources and wealth, trade and economic imbalances, pandemics, migrations forced by regimes, criminals and environment, intercultural intolerances, sea levels rising and water tables falling – all of these and more at play against the context of current geopolitical structures. To many, we are in dire straits. Climate is changing. Oil is peaking. If we push beyond 550 ppm, we enter a territory where our theories, knowledge and experience may not be able to guide us. Terra Incognita. Geological history – if we know it all – may well be headed for a U-turn. The period of consequence of having become so many denizens on this planet has only now begun – it will last at least 100 years. Seven billion people will soon become economically active. Yet the only way we know how to create wealth is to tap the resources of the Earth. How do we protect this ecological living space? For our children, our families and communities. Reconnecting with nature

Details of Nature activities

On Friday 30 June 2006, after the Plenary Session IV, the afternoon and evening will offer participants the opportunity to spend some “open space” time in nature. We suggest that this space is used for conversations, retreat and reflection. We also encourage informal groups that will have formed during the Forum and who wish to meet for a few hours of dialogue to use these activities as venues for their meetings. The following options are available.

Nature walk in and around Tällberg.

Three different excursions are on offer, all departing from Holen at 16.45 and returning to the hotels by 20.30 in time for dinner.

Destination 1: Siljansnäs. This group will depart by bus for Siljansnäs (40 minute ride) and Naturrum on the top of Björnberget, an open-air museum with beautiful views of the region. After a guided visit and walk through the forest, the group will gather for a conversation on the theme “Out in nature – our strained relationship with the environment” with *Alan Atkisson* (Earth Charter Initiative, Sweden), *Sverker Sörlin* (Professor, Swedish Institute for Education and Research, Sweden) and *Jim Wine* (Tällberg Foundation, United States).

Destination 2: The island of Tjuguholmen. After gathering at Holen at 16.45, this group will depart by boat from Tällberg to the small island of Tjuguholmen, where a traditional mediaeval camp will have been reconstructed to show how people and nature interacted many centuries ago.

Pers Lars Larsson (Green Cross, Sweden) will guide, and there will be opportunities for small-group conversations and reflections.

Destination 3: Ullvi Bystuga. This group will depart by bus (15 minutes) for Ullvi Bystuga, a farmhouse situated near Leksand, for conversations. This destination is reserved for pre-formed groups in search of a suitable venue for their conversations.

Overnight excursion

For this more intensive option, participants will spend the evening and night in the forest and return to Tällberg on Saturday morning. After travelling by bus (about 45 minutes) to a suitable venue for this excursion, the participants will gather for conversations and reflection, common dinner cooked by the campfire, fireside chats and sleep under the stars, before returning to Tällberg by 8.00 on Saturday morning. The facilitators will include *Göran Gennvi* (Nature Academy Learning Lab, Sweden), *Oren Lyons* (Onondaga Council, Iroquois Confederacy) and *John P. Milton* (author and teacher, United States). (Pre-registration is required for this option and most will have registered prior to the Forum. However, you can contact the Forum staff to enquire whether there are any available spaces.
